NO CHANGE IN THE RULE IN PETALUMA

Saloons Will Remain Closed on Sunday—J. L. Dinwiddie Elected Trustee—Mayor Brainerd Resigns

"There will be no change in the present policy of the board of trustees in Petaluma, and the closing of saloons on Sunday will prevail."

Such was the statement made to a Press Democrat representative by J. L. Dinwiddie, the new member of the board of trustees of Petaluma on Monday night after his election as a member of the board to succeed H. P. Brainerd.

This put to flight the rumors that there would be a return to the former plan that had followed the announcement that when President Brainerd resigned, as he did on Monday night, the saloons would open again on Sunday.

President Brainerd's reason for resigning are given as two-fold, ill health and absence from town and other duties preventing his being able to continue in office longer.

Trustee W. C. Keig was elected president of the Board of Trustees of Petaluma, succeeding Mr. Brainerd, and will be acting mayor. Mr. Dinwiddie is a son of the former postmaster of Petaluma, J. L. Dinwiddie.
